
How the First *Karate Kid*

I was 11 years old, had been relocated by my mother from New York to California, and had just recently lost my stepfather in a car accident. My mother was left to raise her two boys alone. I felt lost, and without a positive male role model. My confidence level was low, I was being bullied in school, and my sense of self worth was virtually nonexistent.

When my mother took me to see the movie in 1984, I was moved by the main character and the message. The relationship between Mr. Miyagi and Daniel struck me and I knew that I had to get involved in the martial arts. I was truly inspired.

Within a year, my mom had re-married, and I had become a martial arts fanatic, even though I was not taking any classes. I read and re-read Bruce Lee's "Tao of Jeet Kun Do" multiple times, hung a makeshift punching bag on the tree outside, and began copying moves I had seen in magazines and in movies on my own. Often times, I would wake up an hour before I had to get ready for school to do pushups, hit the bag, and practice what little I was able to pick up. My stepfather at the time told my mother: "If we don't enroll

that boy in some kind of martial arts, he's going to go crazy." So, he took me down to the local Kung Fu San Soo school and signed me up. From that day forward, my life has never been the same. I began to develop a new sense of confidence, and the bullying stopped. My body began to change. I was more fit, and I had a discipline to passionately devote myself to.

Today, 26 years later, my life continues to be transformed by the martial arts. I own and operate a school with over 300

students. I'm surrounded by a fantastic staff, and I am living out a dream that I began to have in high school. Not only have I been mentored by great men and wonderful instructors like Master Dave Hopkins, I have also had the opportunity to see many young men and women come through my doors looking for the kind of confidence that only martial arts can offer. I am honored to show them this way to a better life.

We as leaders in the martial

arts industry have yet another opportunity to reach a whole new generation of kids and adults with the values and life skills that the arts afford us.
